The entire space, except for the kitchen, was demolished for the new layout which includes 3 bars and seating for over 100 people. All work that could have disturbed the upper floor tenants was schedule after hours. Together, Bond Street’s managers and MacKenzie met additional challenges in re-engineering the space through extensive cutting of the concrete slab to run the necessary conduits for the beer and soda lines. One of the few on the East Coast, a custom penny floor was created using more than 20,000 newly minted pennies for the vestibule entrance and is highlighted by two exterior gas torches.

“At MacKenzie, we’re always looking to help bring a space to life. For the Bond Street Social venue, it was an opportunity to work with materials and designs that are not typically used. It’s great to step outside the box and build something bold!” said Vice President Dave Riegel.
